You will pick one book from the summer reading list above and one book of your interest to read for the summer. After completing each story, you will write a paragraph (5 sentences each) summary of what you have read. Your summary should include the main characters, setting, conflict, and resolution. You will have a total of two paragraphs that you will be turning in. The summaries will be due on the first Friday back to school. Happy Reading!

Incoming 6th Graders:

Choose one of the following books to read. It should be one that you have not read in a previous class.

Esperanza Rising by Pam Muñoz Ryan

Ella Enchanted by Gail Carson Levine

The Lightning Thief by Rick Riordan

Write a brief (one- to three-paragraph) summary of the book you read. A 6th-grade level summary introduces the main character(s) and the major conflict in the story. It summarizes the important events from the beginning, middle, and end of the story. Paragraphs must be at least 5 sentences in length. Your summary will be due in class on the first day of school after the phase-in day.

Incoming 7th & 8th Graders:

Read at least one book of your choice this summer.

Come to school prepared to discuss and write about the book you read.

*Although the majority of these books are recommended by the American Library Association, we encourage parents and students to investigate and discuss book options together to make appropriate choices.
